How to Say "Kangaroo"

His name is spelled K-o-c-h-e-l, but important choral camp people like Phyllis Swartz, Debbie Diller, and Ken Miller have been calling our Choral Camp mascot "Kershel," with an 'r' in the middle. This has caused some confusion. Camper Quinten Coblentz, of Bach Hall, noticed the kangaroo perched on top of the ice chest at breakfast Wednesday morning and wondered, "How do you say his name?"

"K-o-c-h-e-l" was named for a German musician who organized and numbered the music Mozart composed. Since the name is German, the Record tracked down Choral Campers Ashley and David Dye, both of

whom live in Germany. They agreed that Germans would pronounce the 'o' like the 'o' sound in 'book' and and the 'ch' like the 'ch' in 'chair', and there would be no 'r' sound in the name at all.

But the kangaroo himself, when asked in an interview, said "It's okay to call me 'Kershel' with an 'r' if you want. It's kind of hard to say it the German way, and we're in Ohio right now, not Germany." 
