

Featuring the potential adventures of a Choral Camper named Dal Segno, though she goes by the name of Doll. She's such a sweetie!



Orffing Class Makes the Grade



What is Orff? What does Orff stand for? Orff is the name of a man who loved music and children. Carl Orff lived from 1895 – 1982 and was instrumental (no pun intended) in bringing a lot of different musical sounds together. Some of the instruments he used were drums, xylophones, cymbals, metallophones, glockenspiels and recorders.

This year Choral Campers get to experience some of these instruments in Mrs. Wolfer's *Accent* class and practice making a variety of melodic sounds.
