How can I keep my recorder from squeaking during recorder class?

Dear Wincing,
I am so glad you asked! If only every camper knew the answer to your excellent question. The easiest thing

to do to prevent squeaking is to not blow into your recorder so hard. Think of the squeak as the poor instrument shrieking its distress from being played too hard.

Another thing to try, though it requires a little more skill, is to make sure your fingers completely cover the holes you are closing.

The only guaranteed way to prevent a recorder from squeaking is to not blow into it, but I doubt your teacher would approve.
