Five things you didn't know about Dagestan (but should)

(Editor's note: Choral Camp's culture class covers Dagestan this week.)

- Dagestan is a real place. It is part of Russia. Its name means "land of mountains."
- The people in Dagestan keep their jaws strong with very long words. Their president is named Magomedshala Magomedov, and one of their newspapers is called Makhachkala-linskiye Izvestiya. The tallest mountain is named "Bazaryuzi."
- Don't complain about having to learn another language in school. There are more than 30 languages spoken in Dagestan.
- Dagestan is not very large—it's about half the size of Ohio. But it makes up for that by being almost ten times taller than Ohio. You need to travel to some areas in a helicopter because the mountains are so high and rough. (Or you can climb for a very long time).
- In the United States, many farms have cows. But sheep are more popular in Dagestan. Many of the people there raise sheep because it is too dry for crops.
