# THE BEACHYS HELP BRING GOD'S WORD TO ETHIOPIA

**M**arvin (83,84,87) and Suzanne (Herr) (83) Beachy are two ordinary people with an extraordinary vision for bringing God's Word to people who have never read it in their own language. They have been a part of Wycliffe Bible Translators for the past four years.

While still a teenager, Marvin read Don Richardson's book, *Peace Child*, which helped him catch the vision for Bible translation. When he attended RBI in 1983, he met Suzanne only briefly and did not know that she would one day fit into his plans so significantly. But four years later their paths crossed again when Marvin returned to the area to attend RBI for the third time. By then Suzanne was working as a technical writer of computer software manuals, developing skills that she had no idea could contribute to the translation task. After becoming better acquainted, Suzanne joined Marvin in his vision for Bible translation, and they were married. Following a year of linguistics study with SIL (Summer Institute of Linguistics) they applied for membership with Wycliffe and were accepted. They then spent one year in linguistics training before they were finally off to Africa. After arriving in Ethiopia, they received their assignment for Bible translation with the Dizi (pronounced DEE-ZEE) people of southwest Ethiopia. They plan to move to the Dizi area, a two-days' journey by car over rough terrain from Addis

Ababa, and begin translation work in December of this year. Until then, they will continue to live in Addis Ababa, the capital city of Ethiopia, where they are studying the

Other frustrations involve learning the complex Amharic language and feeling cut off from family and friends. The greatest joys? "Receiving packages from America!" laughs Suzanne. On a more

The project with the Dizi people is targeted to take 10-15 years to complete. The Beachys explain that the finished project will likely include all of the New Testament and parts of the Old Testament, with the possibility of some of the Old Testament books being condensed versions.

Marvin and Suzanne's vision has taken them across the ocean, and has brought cultural adjustments, homesickness and insecurity, as well as joy and contentment. They believe that their vision is God's vision for them, which makes it all worthwhile.



# PARLA STOLTZFUS HITS THE HIGH SEAS

Imagine waking up each morning to the sound of sea gulls screaming overhead, waves lapping, the smell of ocean salt and a blue sky above. Sound like a vacation? For **Parla Stoltzfus (82, 83, 86)** waking up to a day on the ocean has been part of her job. Parla recently completed an assignment with Mercy Ships, an arm of Youth With a Mission (YWAM) that sends four medically equipped ships throughout the maritime regions of the world to minister, both physically and spiritually, to needy people. In 1995 Parla came aboard the *Anastasis*, a nine-story, twelve-thousand ton ship which travels mainly to African countries, and began working in the administration office. She says, "People have the idea that you need to be a doctor or nurse to go on a ship. But there are many jobs for support kinds of people—from housekeeping, to the dining room, to administrative people, to carpenters, plumbers and engineers. Approximately

a lot of governmental red tape, of course. A team is sent in advance of the ship, working with government officials, health officials and port authorities to ensure that the proper papers and support are in order.

Parla didn't spend all of her time in the office. "It was fun to take my guitar and go with a friend down to the hospital ward to sing with the patients. Those who could get out of bed would come and join us. We would sit in a circle and they would get out their African drums and start beating with the music," she recalls. Through her music ministry, Parla had the opportunity of building a special friendship with a woman named Inocentia. She came aboard for facial reconstructive surgery because of a disease that was eating away at her face. Her surgical procedure involved the doctors rebuilding her nose from part of her scalp. "It was a huge procedure and she was so excited...I would go down a couple of times

a week and sing for her. She loved it." They still keep in touch and Parla hopes to see her again someday.

Since leaving the ship last summer, Parla has been involved with the School of Worship, another arm of YWAM. She completed five months of training and is now in Switzerland, where she helps train people

from around the world to go back to their countries as worship leaders. She says, "My interest is...training people in worship...with the goal of multiplying ourselves in places in the world where they don't know what it means to worship God."

Originally from Pennsylvania, Parla has many fond memories of her time at RBI in the eighties. "I see it as a real place of building on what I learned as a kid...and really opening up my world perspective. In addition to Bible training, it was a good transition to stepping out, finding my own ministry and learning to depend on God instead of the people who I left at home."



400 people live and work on the *Anastasis* during its months of outreach. Parla explains that the ship usually spends about six months of the year in a port of a developing country, where trained crew members perform surgeries, help with construction projects, distribute clothing and other supplies. The ship then spends the rest of each year in the developed world on a public relations tour to raise support and gather supplies. These are donated by pharmaceutical companies, construction companies and clothing stores—items that are given free to the people who need them. All of this requires

## Berlin Profile...

*RBI began as a six-week Bible school held each winter from 1952 until 1963 at the Pleasant View Church in Berlin, Ohio. Conservative Mennonite Bible School (unofficially called Berlin Bible School) was a teaching ministry of the Conservative Mennonite Conference. The school moved to Rosedale in 1963, and later became known as Rosedale Bible Institute. Here is a profile of an alumnus who attended Berlin in the 50's.*

**Wilbur Kaufman** is a semi-retired construction superintendent who attended Berlin in 1953 when he was 17 years old. Since then he has given many years of service to God through his local church in a

variety of ways. Through the years he has been involved in short term prison work, has served on the board of a ministry to reach out to troubled teens and has assisted with his small group in several community ministries, such as preparing a meal and ministering at a local mission.

But Wilbur's main passion is encouraging others to share his excitement for the Word of God. He believes, "Scriptures become interesting, become more than just reading a novel, when we are hungry and thirsty for them, and they become words that we live by." Wilbur spends a lot of time studying the Bible, and for many years has been working on a hundred-foot-long biblical history chart that is themed "God Moving and Working Among His People." Another area of interest for Wilbur is early church history, and over the years he has gathered a collection of the writings of the early church fathers. He has taught many Sunday school classes and speaks on a variety of topics for Wednesday evening services in other area churches.

Wilbur has also volunteered his time at the conference level—he served on the Christian worker's committee and is currently on the conference historical committee.

Wilbur grew up in the Goshen, Indiana area, where he met and married his wife Effie (Zehr). They have four sons and eleven living grandchildren. Wilbur was a licensed minister for two years in the early 60's and he pastored the North Wayne Mennonite congregation in Michigan. The Kaufmans are members of the Townline congregation in Goshen, Indiana.

## RBI Graduates Largest Class in Its History

Thirty-eight students graduated from Rosedale Bible Institute on May 22, making RBI history as its largest graduating class. President Leon Zimmerman and Academic Dean Jon Showalter presented diplomas and certificates to the graduates—eight of whom finished the three year Institute of Pastoral Studies (IPS) regimen of courses to receive a certificate in Pastoral Studies. Other graduates completed a variety of programs, including

- In May the first *Institute of Pastoral Studies* (IPS) students completed the three year program. Eight men graduated, receiving certificates in *Pastoral Studies*. IPS will begin its fourth year this fall, and will be offering the following courses with one week of classroom instruction followed by assignments to be completed on a correspondence basis: *Pastoral Care and Counseling*, *Understanding the Old Testament*, and *Introduction to Theology*.

- A team from the Accrediting Association of Bible Colleges (AABC) visited the RBI campus in March as part of the accrediting process. RBI won't officially be informed of the team's recommendation until next year, but their comments were very positive.

- The Conservative Mennonite Conference will hold its annual conference on the campus of Rosedale Bible Institute in August, hosted by local CMC churches.

- The Rosedale Chorale presented programs in Iowa, Illinois, Indiana and Ohio during a 10 day tour April 4-13. In addition to the tour, the thirty-five member chorale gave weekend programs in Ohio. This year's musical selections focused on the theme "Give Me Jesus" and were directed by Kenneth Miller (79). The Rosedale Chorale, in its thirty-first year, is an important tradition at RBI.

Two hundred high school students from six schools in six different states descended upon the RBI campus April 25-27 for a weekend of singing and making new friends at the seventh biennial Christian High School Choral Festival. The weekend's highlight was a choral program which included individual choir selections and a 200-voice mass chorus directed by guest conductor Lloyd Kauffman. The RBI chapel was filled to capacity as over 300 people came to the program, many parents driving from other

states to attend. Lloyd Kauffman conducted a variety of songs, including two African numbers which the students seemed to enjoy singing as much as the audience enjoyed hearing. The worshipful song "Come Unto Me", was a fitting ending for the afternoon concert.

Kauffman, who directed the Rosedale Chorale for 25 years, believes that the value of the choral festival was in giving small schools a chance to participate in something much larger than themselves. "Many of the students can't experience fullness musically in smaller settings. It's probably a more complete musical experi-

ence just because of the massive sound that is there. This is true both musically and spiritually," he said. For **Kevin Yoder (87)**, school choir director from Greenwood, Delaware, the best thing about the choral festival was the opportunity the students had to interact with other students and to sing in a large mass chorus. "It's a good musical experience as well as a social experience." RBI's Choral festival tradition began in 1985.

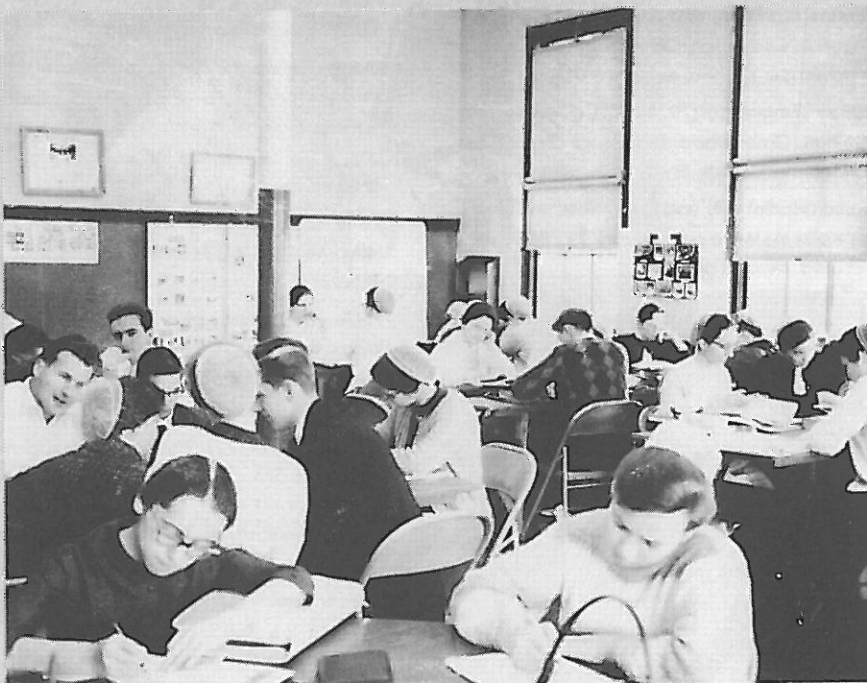

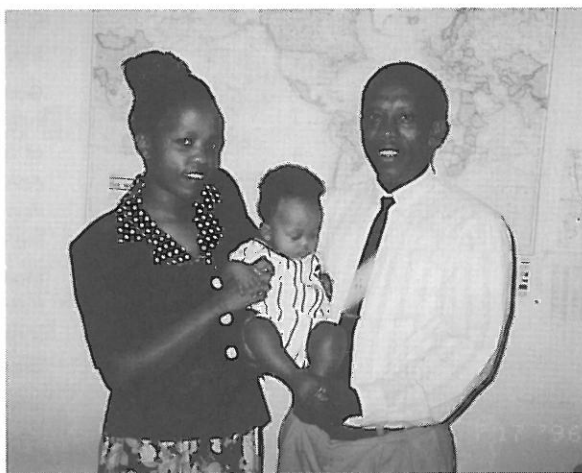

# RBI Alumni Scattered Abroad

**R**ecently I heard of an Amish brother who is nearing his eightieth birthday, and has yet to travel more than fifty miles from his place of birth. Many RBI alumni have grandparents and great-grandparents with a similar story. Some of the students at RBI from developing countries

have relatives and friends who have traveled even less than our Amish friend. Anthropologists tell us that in areas where tribalism is still strong, this phenomenon exists—a person may travel less than twenty miles from home in a lifetime. In the world's urban centers gang members typically stay within a relatively small "turf" area.

However, things are quite different among RBI alumni. They are living in many countries throughout the world and an increasing number of *Mirrors* are being sent overseas. Perhaps you are reading this *Mirror* in

Albania, Jamaica or Tanzania. As alumni continue moving to many places around the globe, the list of countries to which the *Mirror* is sent keeps growing.

Things are much the same among current RBI students. A growing number of students are coming to RBI from around the world. In the last seven years students have come from seventeen countries. A growing number of students are coming to RBI after a cross-cultural mission or service experience. It is not uncommon to chat with students who have been outside the USA more than once.

Why is this generation much more apt to be found scattered to the four corners of the earth? The reasons are many, and I will not even begin to enumerate them. I do believe that our sovereign Lord has a significant part to play in the matter. For reasons and purposes which are far beyond us, he is calling and sending this generation to do his work, in these places, at this time, for his glory.

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
