Making A Joyful Noise!

Music has played a significant role throughout RBI's history, whether it has been spontaneous singing or organized groups such as gospel teams, chorus and chorale. Many students have come to RBI over the years just to participate in the music program. Ken Miller is in his second year as chorale director and music instructor at RBI. He feels that there are several purposes for the music classes and chorale: "The music program provides students with necessary tools and skills to serve as competent musicians in churches

and other places of ministry. Chorale gives the students a chance to learn and perform choral music in a formal setting. It also provides an opportunity for students to get out into various churches to minister and see a broader spectrum of Mennonite churches." Current chorale member Joy Helmuth expresses what she has learned musically: "(I've learned) how to work together with every other musical part to make beautiful music. If one person or part is off doing their own thing it throws the whole piece off."

Alumni Profile

Music plays an important role in **Duane Hershberger's (77, 79)** life. He serves as worship leader and one of the pastors at Americus Mennonite Church in Americus, Georgia. Duane describes the style of worship at his church as a combination of spirituals, hymns, and contemporary praise songs.

While at RBI, Duane took every music class offered by former music instructor Lloyd Kauffman, and he credits RBI for helping to confirm that he wanted to continue in music. In addition to music classes, Duane enjoyed participating in chorale and singing in an unofficial school trio with two other students, Paul Kurtz and Leon Miller. He remembers a humorous chorale incident: "We were giving a program, and when Lloyd had us go around and say where we were from, chorale decided to give strange names close to where we were from. I remember the look on Lloyd's face." Duane recalls a memory from the trio: "Leon, Paul and I sang at nearby Shekinah Christian School and we were all sick. We were well enough to go singing, but not well enough to go back and attend classes."

After RBI, Duane continued his musical education, graduating from Millersville



University in Pennsylvania with a degree in Music Theory and Composition.

In addition to his role as church worship leader, Duane also enjoys some other musical involvements. He ran a coffee house for awhile, performing jazz, blues and acoustic styles of vocal music. He currently sings with a band, along with two other "middle-aged men" (Duane's words), performing contemporary pop/oldies songs for weddings and other gatherings.

Duane is employed at Habitat for Humanity as a distribution services manager. His responsibilities include shipping out between 150-200 packages of informational materials each day and coordinating the mail. (No, he does not know Jimmy Carter personally.) Duane's wife Ruth is a nurse at their local hospital. The Hershbergers are enjoying their three children: Ben (12), Heidi (9) and Carson (5).

When alumni recall their musical memories at RBI, one name comes to mind for the majority—Lloyd Kauffman. Lloyd came to RBI to teach music in the fall of 1972 and began directing the chorale that year. He was at RBI for 23 years. He recalls one of his more memorable experiences as chorale director: "We were touring the Mormon tabernacle in Salt Lake City, Utah, and the tour guide let us sneak up on to the platform between guided tours to sing a couple of songs. We sang one phrase, and I thought the sound seemed awfully small until we stopped and heard this reverb keep coming back. It was interesting to be in a place that is so well known and to be able to feel the marvelous acoustics of the place." Lloyd also recalls times when he felt that the chorale really ministered: "The first year, we sang at a small church in St. Petersburg, Florida, with many retirees. I didn't know how the choral-style program would connect. Afterwards an older man came up and said with tears how one song meant so much to him, 'Go Not Far From Me Oh God', particularly the line, 'cast me not away from you in my age when my strength faileth me.' It stood out to me because it was so unexpected in that

setting." Another experience took place in eastern Germany a year and a half after Communism collapsed. The chorale sang in an old church where Martin Luther had frequently preached, located in Herzberg, a short distance from Luther's home in Wittenberg. The chorale was told that they were the first Americans to ever sing there. Lloyd recalls, "The program felt tentative at first, but felt more comfortable as we continued...Some of the older people connected with the older German hymns. We concluded with 'Take Thou My Hand, O Father' and the pastor came up to dismiss the group, but no one moved. He said something like, 'Maybe our hearts are too full to leave.' Everyone just sat there for two or three minutes." A similar experience took place in the mid-seventies when the group was invited to sing at Fairbanks High School, near Rosedale. "I was apprehensive about singing for public high school students. We closed with a quiet prayer song and afterwards it was deathly quiet, but it was a connecting sort of silence. To me it was a greater compliment than if there had been a lot of applause."

What was one of the funniest experiences? Lloyd remembers the time that the chorale was beginning a program at a church in Oregon. Just after Lloyd had conducted the opening song (from the back) and the pastor asked people to stand for prayer, an usher called him to the phone. Lloyd's mother-in-law had not been well when they had left for tour, so he was worried as he picked up the receiver. The caller was Betty (Schrock) Wilkins, his next door neighbor, with a question: "Who did you say you wanted to give your cherries to?" She had miscalculated the time and didn't realize she was interrupting the program. Lloyd remembers, "I tried to keep from howling as I hurried up the side to the front, getting there just as people were being seated again. For most of the

first part of the program I had to struggle to keep my concentration."

Tight schedules, nervousness about not being ready for the first program and broken-down buses have all been part of the chorale experience. Lloyd recalls the bus breaking down near Archbold, Ohio: "When I finally got to a phone we moved the evening program back two hours and I arranged with a friend who lived nearby for a church bus and motor home to take us to southwestern Michigan, still over three hours away. When we got to the church, the door of the motor home jammed and we couldn't get out for another 15 minutes! The church had been packed at the original starting time, but not as many people came back. We quickly lined up and sang in our in our street clothes. One song in the program had a major narration part and just before going in I noticed that the narrator had a Micky Mouse T-shirt on—hardly fitting the mood of the song! Someone quickly gave him a jacket to put on over it."

Over the years the chorale has travelled to many parts of the United States and through much of Europe. Current chorale member Sabrina Funk, who was also in chorale last year, says that the tours have been the highlight of her experience. "I enjoyed seeing different parts of the country as well as visiting new churches and getting to know new people—the whole time being surrounded by some of my best friends."

Second year chorale member Arlin Sauder reflects on what he has learned spiritually through his chorale experience: "Our musical praise to God is timeless. From the hymn authors of centuries ago to the writers of today, the praise of God continues. Through music, any life can be touched with the love of God."

Alumni Profile

Since attending RBI for the 1977-78 school year, **Regina Yutzy-Wolfer** has kept busy with a musical career. Although Regina currently stays home full-time to home-school her children, she was a music teacher for ten years,

mostly at the elementary level. Even now she has many opportunities to use her musical abilities at church and in giving private piano lessons.

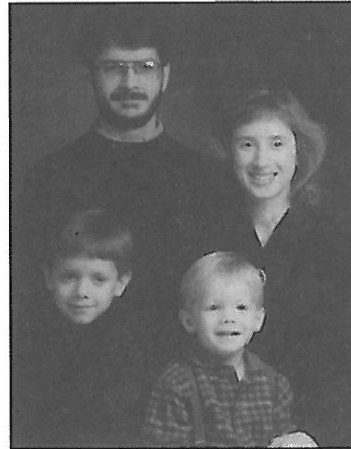
Taking the music courses offered by RBI and singing in chorale provided a background for Regina to go on for further training: she studied Music Education, receiving a bachelor's degree from Cedarville College, Cedarville, Ohio, and a master's degree

from Jackson University, Jackson, Mississippi. While working on her graduate degree, she obtained a teaching assistant (T.A.) position at the university as a minority because she was white. This later helped her get a teaching job at a school in Chicago that was 98% African-American.

Besides chorale and the classes at RBI that gave her a background to continue her musical education, Regina gained confidence and experience by the opportunity to accompany students in their private voice lessons and to play for chorale. She says another good opportunity happened after RBI when she accompanied the Harvest Singers, a touring group that represented Rosedale Mennonite Missions.

Another very positive experience for Regina at RBI was learning to know her husband Terry. Regina and Terry now live in South Carolina where Terry teaches in the social work program at the graduate level at the University of South Carolina. They attend Columbia Christian Fellowship, an evangelical, interdenominational, interracial church. Terry and Regina have two sons: Matthew, 9 and David, almost 5.

Regina sums up her experience at RBI: "I'm thankful for the year I had at Rosedale. It's been a wonderful foundation."

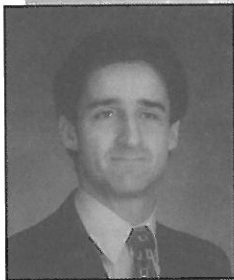

Linford describes RBI as a major stepping stone in his musical career. He

graduated in RBI's two-year music and worship leadership program, then went to Cedarville College, Cedarville, Ohio, for three more years, receiving a bachelor's degree in elementary education with a minor in music. While at RBI, Linford sang in chorale, chorus, and the Salt & Light Co., a music and drama team. As part of his program of study, he also was involved in lead-

ing worship at an area church in a supervised, practical training experience. He reflects on this experience: "It helped me to look at myself, utilize my potential...and to make me more effective in many avenues of ministry."

Linford's involvement with music and RBI didn't end when he left Rosedale: for about one year he sang with a group of Cedarville students who had also been at Rosedale and had sung on chorale. The group gave an average of two programs per month, singing in churches that they had visited with chorale while at RBI.

Besides keeping a busy teaching schedule, Linford attends Upper Deer Creek Mennonite Church in Kalona, where he sings on a four-member worship team. He shares one of his first memories of his time at RBI: "(I remember) walking into the chapel on a Sunday evening, seeing everybody singing their hearts out in a worship time led by an African student and thinking, 'Wow, this is worship!'"

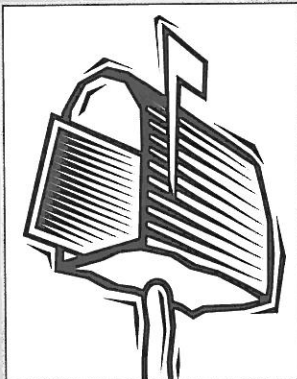

Discernment Needed

A few times this past academic year I found myself in a discussion in which a person was attempting to make a rather significant decision. In each case information from vastly different perspectives was part of the equation.



In one case, when contemporary Christian music was in question, two books were in consideration. One book clearly stated that contemporary Christian music, with its syncopated rock format, is *the* tool of the evil one to lure this generation to music that would warp our spiritual beings and deceive us. The other book, a response to the first one, presented the case that con-

temporary Christian Music is *the* anointed tool of the Holy Spirit to lead this generation in a new wave of godly worship and to make the gospel message relevant to today's culture.

This phenomenon need not be limited to one subject. The same scenario is found in issues such as divorce and remarriage, women in leadership, playing with the "deck" of cards, use of computer

technology, etc, etc. In each case vastly differing positions are presented by Christians.

In the days of Jeremiah a similar situation existed. Jeremiah told the Jews who were not already in exile to submit to the Babylonians and allow them to take them into exile. He also reported, from the Lord, that the exile would last for seventy years. Other prophets, speaking as from the Lord, stated the opposite. They said the exile would be short lived and encouraged a non-submissive posture to the Babylonians. Most followed the "other" prophets who turned out to be false prophets. Life would have been much better had they listened to Jeremiah, but his word was not what they wanted to hear.

Probably the greatest need in today's pluralistic Christian world is discernment. Isaiah said, "Woe to those who call evil good and good evil" (5:20). None of us wants to teach or counsel that something is of God when it's not or vice versa. We could be ministers of darkness while believing we are ministers of light. WOW!

Lord, grant us a full measure of Holy Spirit discernment for the living of these days.
