

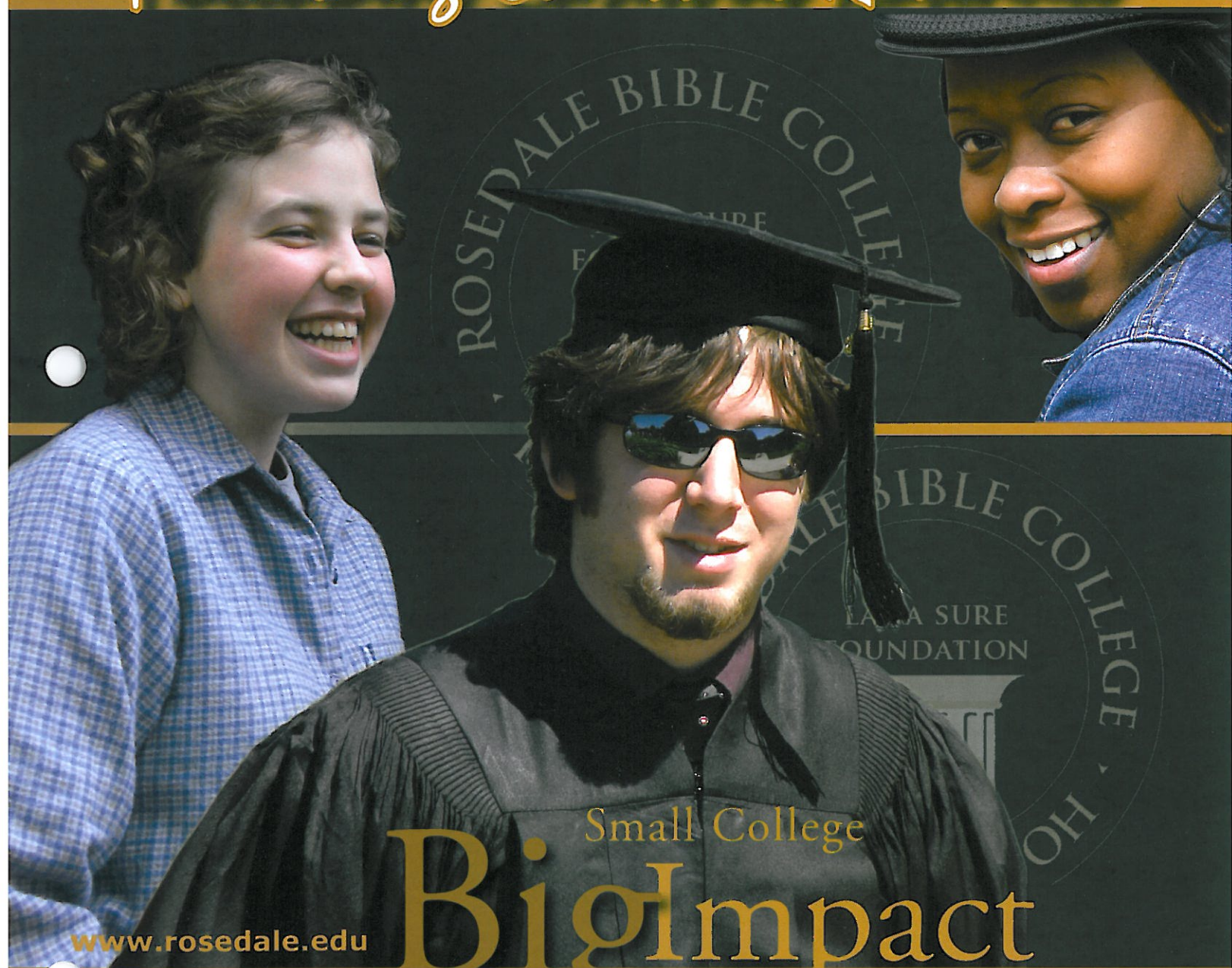

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Fighting on 'the most dangerous sector' *Why the new endowed chairs at Rose*

It is in the educational field that the struggle for or against God is being decided today. Teachers fight on the most dangerous sector of the front.

By now, we hope you have received a brochure announcing the creation of two endowed chairs at Rosedale Bible College: the *Elmer Jantzi Chair of Theology* and the *Willard Mayer Chair of Bible*.

If you did, you read the explanation: "The purpose of these chairs is to honor the life and ministry of these two brothers, and to help Rosedale Bible College remain faithful to the best attributes of its history as embodied by their lives."

But what does that mean? And why does it matter?

What are these chairs about?

By endowing two chairs and appointing faculty members to them, RBC hopes to accomplish several things. We want to encourage faculty to emulate Elmer and Willard's spirit of service, commitment to the Word, and interest in students' spiritual and intellectual development; we also hope to provide time and funding for scholarship, writing and professional development for the faculty members who hold these chairs.

Why are these chairs important?

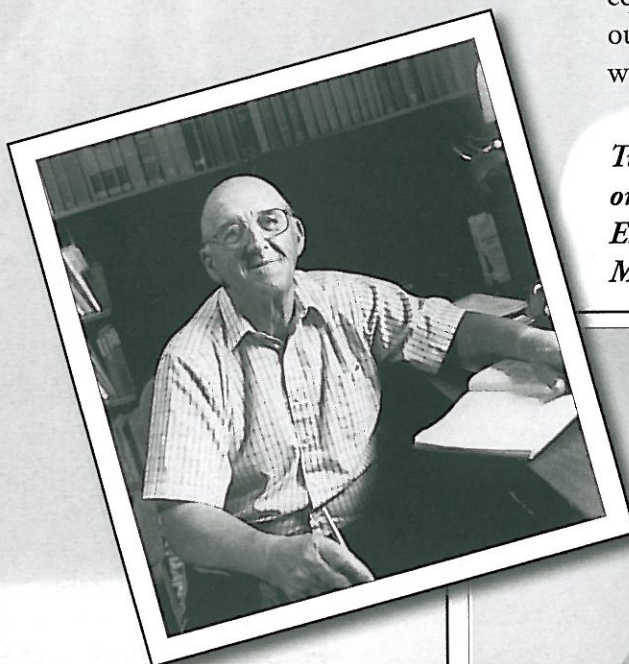
Asked to discuss the purpose of the chairs, faculty member Ken Miller said, "When someone fills the chair, they are in some sense carrying on the tradition set by the people for whom it's named." It's our way, he explained, of carrying on the spirit of the instructor.

Another faculty member, Reuben Sairs, said, "This is not about seating!" The chairs are a way of honoring Willard and Elmer, he explained, "by making sure their approach is in some way preserved."

Sairs said that establishing the chairs looks backward and forward, honoring what has been and making sure it continues.

Why does this matter to our students?

Acknowledging that the level of academic sophistication is going up all over the Mennonite world, Sairs said the faculty at RBC has to keep up. "In order to equip our students we need to equip ourselves...to be the kind of resource we need to be for our students."

Faculty members can't just rely on what they learned in grad school, he said. "We have to keep current in our fields and know not just what's happening now but also what's happening next."

Ken Miller thinks it's also a matter of taking seriously the responsibilities and opportunities that come with being a Bible college. "With postmodernism, people are realizing again that there's more than just the material world," he said. "And we [at RBC] deal with more than just the material world."

Sairs stressed that our students are not living in isolation from the rest of the world. The need for RBC students "to be able to articulate their faith is critical to their Christian witness," he said. "They can't stand there dumbfounded the first time they're confronted with disbelief."

Part of equipping students is helping them to develop into the kind of person God wants them to be, Sairs said. Bible colleges have resisted the idea that education has to be utilitarian. "It's about being a better human being," he said. "It's about developing a full human being, in the way God wants someone to flourish."

Utilitarians equip for a job, he said. "We're equipping people."

If you go to "Big State U," said Sairs, "if you don't fit their niche or their track, they don't know how to respond." At RBC, we're not just trying to race students through a program.

If someone comes to Rosedale and says, "I want to learn to be the person God wants me to be," we can say, "We know what you're talking about," said Sairs.

New academic dean at RBC

ROSEDALE, Ohio -- The Rosedale Bible College Board of Trustees and the Conservative Mennonite Conference (CMC) Executive Board have appointed Philip Weber as the next academic dean of Rosedale Bible College. Weber's appointment was ratified by the CMC ministerial body at its February 20 meeting.

Departing dean Jon Showalter ends his term of service on June 30, 2008, and the "official passing of the baton" took place at the CMC conference this summer, said RBC President Dan Ziegler.

Ziegler said the choice was made "after a search process that looked both inside and outside of the college." It became clear he said, that Phil Weber was "ideally positioned in both experience and gifting" to assume the post of academic dean.

Listing Weber's strong academic credentials, proven leadership experience, first-hand appreciation for the mission of RBC, and lifetime of service for the church, Ziegler expressed "high confidence" in his ability to guide Rosedale Bible College's academic department.

Weber brings six years of RBC faculty experience and considerable administrative expertise to the position. Before joining the faculty in January 2002, he served for 13 years as president of the We Care Program, a prison ministry in Atmore, Ala.

He also brings a clear sense of mission to the task, and says one of his highest priorities will be "to work with the faculty to tune our curriculum to best serve the needs of current students and the goals of the college."

The new dean hopes to expand the

breadth and depth of the college's interaction with the leaders of CMC: "What I would like to see is a more dynamic sense of partnership between the ministers and the college in working out what it means to follow Jesus faithfully in this time and in this culture."

As webmaster for the school, Weber is in touch with the potential of technology for education. He wants to develop a distance education program that will expand RBC's student body "beyond the core of college-age young people who are able to relocate to our campus and devote full time to study."

Citing a "significant interest in online study" among the college's constituency, he says that "the available technology creates a great opportunity for us and for a new contingent of adult students who want to keep a growing edge."

Weber says that at times he has struggled to know whether he should understand himself as a teacher who can administer, or as an administrator who can teach. "The role of academic dean feels like a good fit to me, because it brings together those two long-term passions."

One of the things he most looks forward to is leading the faculty team. "Being a member of a great team is one of the joys of working at RBC," he says.

Weber is an elder at Shiloh Mennonite Church in Resaca, Ohio, and lives in Rosedale with Twila, his wife of 29 years. They are the parents of Jonathan, Amanda, and Andrew. Weber received a diploma from Rosedale in 1979, a B.A. from Cedarville University in 1982, and an M.A. in Bible and Theology from the University of Mobile in 2003.

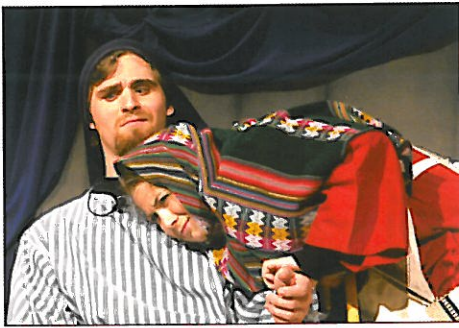

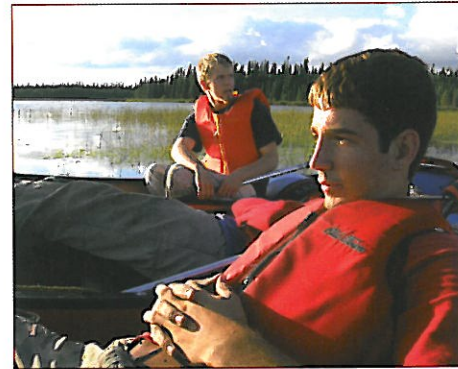

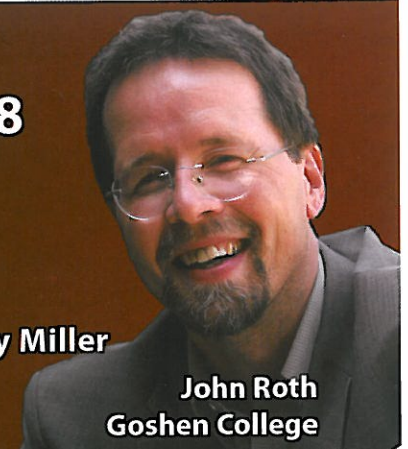

Remembering Why We're Here

President Dan Ziegler Willard Mayer recently gave me a box of newsletters spanning a half century of this college's history. As I rifled through the documents, one magazine caught my eye: the January 1977 issue of *Guidelines for Today*, which featured a special report on the 25th anniversary of Rosedale Bible Institute. It was fascinating to look back at the perspectives of the faculty who were here at that time. Of particular interest were the thoughts of brothers Willard and Elmer regarding what justified Rosedale's reason for existence:

Elmer Jantzi: "Well, I really think that the uniqueness of RBI lies in her Bible-centered program. As a matter of fact, I feel her right to exist lies there. My own feeling is that the more we can keep it Bible-centered and stay away from what I call the higher administrative approach to

things, the more effective we are going to be in reaching more people."

Willard Mayer: "I hope that we can always keep in close proximity with the church; that we feel the pulse of the church and that the pulse of the church directs the school. If we move away from the church we will lose the real purpose for which the school is intended."

What is obvious from these quotes has also been confirmed in the lives of our brothers, and that is their unwavering commitment to the centrality of the Word of God and to the church. One of the main reasons we have established the Willard Mayer Chair of Bible and the Elmer Jantzi Chair of Theology is to perpetuate the spirit of faithfulness these brothers represented during their time of service at Rosedale. As this college moves forward, may our commitment to Jesus continue to be borne out by a willingness to teach a faith grounded on His Word and true to His church.
